With reverse tie dye you basically strip out the colour from a dark t-shirt, using a dilute bleach solution, carefully following all safety procedures, before then adding other colours to the then bleached out sections.

Bird Boxes

Pacific were given the task in DT to build bird boxes to take home for their gardens.

It was important to begin the project in the Autumn term so they could be finished and installed for the birds to use in the spring.

Two types of bird box were available, those with a post box style entrance for the Robins and the simple hole type preferred by the Great and Blue Tits.

Before starting to make our boxes for home, we decided it would be a good idea to look at the ones already round the school gardens, take them down and refurbish them.

The old boxes were removed from the trees, cleaned out, sanded down, parts were repaired or replaced sometimes making one good one from two old ones, painted and returned to the trees.

We are pleased to report that this process was very successful and many of the dwellings proved very desirable. Two weeks ago, or so, we discovered that a brood of Blue Tits had flown the nest in the Forest School area and were on the ground with their mother feeding them. We are pretty sure some other boxes have been equally successful.

With boxes now in the students' gardens and the refurbished ones in school we hope we have gone a little way to help the bird population of Suffolk.

Cooking Club

Students have been working very hard to bake tasty treats to help with the development of their sensory, motor, and independence skills. Students have then sold these to their peers, and school community, at break times in order to raise money for their chosen charity. The charity chosen by the students for this term is Outreach Youth, a charity based in Suffolk

which supports young people who are part of the LGBTQ+ community. Students have been working especially hard on following a recipe with increased level of independence, as well as building their confidence using equipment such as

hobs and ovens. So far, the students have raised £34 through their sales.

We were delighted to welcome Roy Swain from the East Anglia Air Ambulance (EAAA), an organisation renowned for its life-saving medical services.

East Anglia Air Ambulance is a crucial service providing emergency medical assistance via helicopter in the regions of Norfolk, Suffolk, Cambridgeshire, and Bedfordshire. Operating 24/7, the EAAA team includes highly skilled doctors and paramedics who perform lifesaving procedures at the scene of emergencies—from road accidents to acute medical events.

This visit allowed our students to start to understand the critical role of emergency services, highlighting:

- Medical Innovations: How cutting-edge technology and medical knowledge are used in emergencies.
- **Career Insights**: Paths to pursuing a career in emergency medical services and the skills required.
- **Community Impact**: The significant contributions of the EAAA to our local and wider community.

The students asked lots of questions, and listened brilliantly, which gave them insights into the workings of emergency medical services.

We were all amazed that they are a standalone charity, with no funding from Central Government.

It gave us a huge appreciation of the very important work the volunteer sector do for the public.

(Personal Social Health and Economic Education)

There are a lot of acronyms in education, and within PSHE there is no shortage! We cover RSHE (Relationships, Sex and Health Education), BV (British Values) and thread SMSC (Social, Moral, Spiritual and Cultural) teachings throughout the curriculum. We could brand these weekly lessons in several different ways: Life Skills, Personal Development, Citizenship, but ultimately, they have the same objective; to prepare young people to live a safe, respectful and fulfilling life.



There is often a lot of talk in the media about what schools do/don't, should/shouldn't teach, and a lot of that falls into the realm of PSHE. At times, stories presented are either isolated or misrepresented, and I hope that any parent or carer that has a concern get in touch with us at CAEA to ask any questions and find out the facts. We recognise that you as parents/ carers are the first teachers of your children and have the most significant influence in enabling your children to grow and mature. Currently the government has a consultation out about changes to statutory guidance on RSHE. I thoroughly recommend you have a look and give your feedback. <u>https://consult.education.gov.uk/rshe-team/review-of-the-rshe-statutory-guidance/</u>

At the start of the new academic year, we will be reviewing our PSHE and RSHE policy. These will be available on the website once updated.

We will also email out an overview of what we aim to cover for that year for each class group, so if you have any questions in advance, we can answer them for you.

Dear Parent/Carer,

As we continue to celebrate our students' achievements and capture special moments during school events, we kindly request your cooperation in ensuring the safety and privacy of all children.


